Newly Discovered – Thomas, also "sayings". (Robert W. Funk 1993)

Epistles – especially Paul (Ehrman, Misquoting Jesus 2005) (Mack, Who Wrote the New Testament 1995)

Authorship (Ehrman, Misquoting Jesus 2005)

Dependencies: Mark Matthew Matthew & Luke – Mark = Q.

Q Luke John.

Dating: Mark, 80's CE; Matthew, late 80's CE; John, 90's CE; Luke, 120 CE. (Mack, Who Wrote the New Testament 1995)

History and Geography – Jews from exile, 539 BCE; Maccabean independence, 140 BCE; Roman conquest, Herod, 63-4 BCE; Revolt and Jerusalem destruction 66-73 CE.


